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State of Knowledge of Nursing Entrepreneurship

1. Nursing Entrepreneurship Today

- Emerging as a key professional direction that drives innovation and advances nursing science
- Moving beyond hospital-based roles → New business models
- Including clinical services, consulting, health-technology innovation, wellness, and education

2. Key Conceptual Developments

- Nurse entrepreneur vs. Nurse Intrapreneur
- Entrepreneurial mindset in nursing
- Conceptual models of entrepreneurial competence
- Expansion of the nursing business

3. Evidence from Recent Reviews

- Most studies are descriptive rather than experimental
- Common nursing business: Home care, chronic care, consulting, wellness
- Strong evidence for improved outcomes in nurse-led models









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Gap of Knowledge in Nursing Entrepreneurship

Gap 1: Limited Rigorous Outcome Evidence	 A few of the RCTs, quasi-experimental studies Minimal outcome data on financial viability, sustainability models, cost-effectiveness
Gap 2: Weak Conceptual & Theoretical Foundations	 Inconsistent and overlapping definitions Limited validated conceptual or theoretical frameworks Need for clear models of nursing entrepreneurship competence
Gap 3: Limited Evidence	 Most studies from the U.S., Canada, Australia, and Western Europe Few from Asia and Africa Lack of evidence in Universal Health Coverage and community systems
Gap 4: Policy, regulatory & Educational Evidence	 Limited evidence on scope-of-practice impacts Unclear regulatory models for supporting nursing businesses Few evaluations of effective entrepreneurship education Limited understanding of gender and structural barriers



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How to Start Nursing Entrepreneurship Research

1. Start with the problem, not the business

Identify a health-system problem where nurses have unique value:

- Gaps in chronic disease management
- Access issues in underserved communities
- Continuity-of-care failures
- Emerging demands such as aging care, digital health, and preventive services





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2. Use appropriate frameworks for studying nursing entrepreneurship models

- Business Model Canvas adapted for nursing entrepreneurship
- Value Proposition Canvas
- Implementation Science frameworks in evaluation RE-AIM
- Mixed methods designs to capture both outcomes and experiences





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3. Build evidence step-by-step

1. Exploratory phase

- Qualitative interviews
- Context assessments
- Stakeholder needs
- Policy and regulatory analysis

2. Development phase

- Co-design a nursing entrepreneurship model
- Pilot feasibility studies
- Service blueprinting

3. Evaluation phase

- Mixed-methods evaluation
- Clinical & business outcomes
- Cost-effectiveness
- Client satisfaction

4. Scale-up phase

- Implementation science
- Sustainability and scalability analysis





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
